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

Carpinteria Creek Fish Passage Restoration Project

SCHR is gearing up for a large construction project this coming fall in the Carpinteria Creek Watershed. The project will remove the last major barrier from the watershed and improve upstream migration opportunities for southern steelhead trout. The project will remove an undersized bridge and 98 foot section of concreted stream channel and banks in order to restore the stream channel and provide fish passage through the site. The stream channel will be restored to a natural slope with streambed material (large boulders, cobbles, and fine materials). In addition the vertical stream banks will be laid back to a stable slope and re-vegetated with native plants. Removal of this barrier has been a goal of the Carpinteria Creek Watershed Coalition for a number of years. SCHR looks forward to completing this important milestone in the restoration of Carpinteria Creek. The project has funding from the Department of Fish and Wildlife's Fisheries Restoration Grant Program, as well as the Santa Barbara County Coastal Resource Enhancement Fund (CREF), US Fish and Wildlife

Service, California Fish Passage Forum, State Coastal Conservancy, and the property owners. SCHR is currently finalizing environmental permitting requirements and hopes to begin construction in August. Construction will be complete in October and re-vegetation efforts will begin with the onset of winter rains.

Santa Barbara Steelhead Recovery Group

SCHR is working to coordinate quarterly meetings of the Santa Barbara Steelhead Recovery Group. A small group of local government, non-profit and agency representatives working to plan and coordinate fisheries restoration actions in Santa Barbara County. The group had their first meeting of 2015 last month in Santa Barbara and had a lengthy discussion about the drought and its impacts to local streams and steelhead populations. CREATURE FEATURE: SOUTHWESTERN POND TURTLE (*Actinemys marmorata pallida*)



The Southwestern pond turtle is a small turtle that's shell can grow to 8 inches in length. It enjoys slow moving wetland habitats with easily accessible basking sites, including ponds, streams, marshes, and lakes. Its range extends from southern San Francisco to northern Baja. They are opportunistic omnivores and eat just about everything they can, from plants to macro-invertebrates. The Southwestern Pond Turtle is seasonally active and can hibernate from late October to early April, however, some individuals have been spotted in the Santa Barbara area during these hibernation months. The Southwestern Pond Turtle and the Northwestern Pond turtle were thought to be the same species until a recent examination of the animal's genetic makeup divided them into two distinct species. They reproduce around age 8 or 9, and can lay anywhere between 1 to 13 eggs. These eggs hatch in early spring, and emerge from the nest. The young turtles are extremely vulnerable to predation from large fish, snakes, frogs, and raccoons. The Southwestern pond turtle is not officially recorded on either the state or federal endangered species list, but it is listed as a "Species of Special Concern" by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. Habitat loss and encroachment from agriculture, grazing, and development threaten this species. SCHR is working to conserve and restore riparian habitats used by the Southwestern pond turtle.

Refugio State Beach Update

In May the Gaviota Coast was hit with a terrible tragedy when an oil pipe line ruptured and spilled roughly 100,000 gallons of crude oil. Over 20,000 gallons eventually reached the ocean and washed up on Refugio State Beach, spreading from there further west and east. Our coastline and local wildlife have been greatly impacted by this tragedy. Numerous birds and mammals have been sickened and killed from oil exposure. SCHR was at Refugio Beach and nearby Tajiguas Beach on Wednesday, May 20th, the morning after the spill first occurred. Our extensive restoration efforts at the mouth of Refugio Creek were not harmed by the spill. Native vegetation at the site was beyond the reach of high tides and no oil reached the mouth of



Refugio Creek. As cleanup efforts continue Refugio State Beach will remain closed. Camping reservations have been canceled through June 25th. For more information about the spill, clean up efforts, volunteer opportunities and photographs check out www.refugioresponse.com/.
